Mr. Koons stated that the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization needs to appoint a Rural Advisor due to the December 31, 2020 term expiration of Doug Jones. He reported that nominations were solicited from the municipalities within Alachua County located outside the Gainesville Metropolitan Area. Mr. Koons stated that three municipalities, Alachua, Archer and High Springs, submitted the names of individuals for consideration.

VIII. STATE ROAD 26 (UNIVERSITY AVENUE) PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

Mr. Koons stated that Chair Arreola requested discussion of pedestrian safety on State Road 26 (University Avenue) to be placed on the meeting agenda.

Chair Arreola noted that the State Road 26 (University Avenue) corridor was a high priority for the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for safe multimodal mobility.

James Hannigan, Florida Department of Transportation District 2 Traffic Operations Engineer, discussed planned shot-term, mid-term and long-term safety modifications to the State Road 26 (University Avenue) corridor and answered questions.

Mr. Koons noted Suzanne McGuire, Legislative Aide to State Senator Keith Perry, was present at the meeting.

Ms. McGuire stated that Senator Perry was monitoring and supporting progress concerning the provision of safety solutions to the State Road 26 (University Avenue) corridor.

Mr. Koons read an email from Cory Mayback (Exhibit 1). Exhibit 2 is an email from Ann Pasquale.

Amy Grasfeller, representing Gators Against Student Pedestrian Deaths, discussed pedestrian safety concerns on State Road 26 (University Avenue).

Mark Mulitzer, University of Florida student, discussed safety concerns along State Road 26 (University Avenue).

Chris Ferlow, President, Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation, discussed its report concerning safety issues, and short-term, mid-term and long-term solutions for State Road 26 (University Avenue).

Kristen Young, Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation Vice-President, discussed long-term safety solutions for State Road 26 (University Avenue).

Tim MacDonald discussed safety concerns along State Road 26 (University Avenue).

Lisa Hammer, representing Gators Against Student Pedestrian Deaths, discussed lowering the speed limit on State Road 26 (University Avenue). She added that the group would work with the Florida Department of Transportation, the City of Gainesville and the University of Florida to make the State Road 26 (University Avenue) corridor safer.

Bob Karp, member, Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation Board, discussed lowering the speed limit on State Road 26 (University Avenue).

Kaley Kiss, Founder, Florida Not One More, discussed the pedestrian fatalities along State Road 26 (University Avenue). She noted that Florida Not One More would work with the Florida Department of Transportation, the City of Gainesville and the University of Florida to make the State Road 26 (University Avenue) corridor safe for students, faculty and Gainesville citizens at-large.

Mr. Hannigan continued to answer Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization member questions. He noted that first responders would be able to navigate the speed tables to be installed/constructed on State Road 26 (University Avenue). He discussed the speed limit reduction process and enhanced penalty zone criteria.

Mayor Poe noted the City's Complete Streets Study is scheduled to be completed within the next five months.

Commissioner Simmons departed the meeting at this time.

IX. METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION TRANSPORTATION ISSUES

Chair Arreola stated that the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization had previously referred discussion of the following transportation issues to this meeting:

- A. Regional Transit System fare structure;
- B. First-Mile and Last Mile Study;
- C. Lighted signal crossing on the State Highway System;
- D. West 13th Street as a complete street and University Avenue, South 2nd Avenue and South 4th Avenue for the University of Florida to East 25 Street; and
- E. Transportation equity in the planning process.

Mr. Koons stated that the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners requested that safety concerns on the State Highway System in addition to State Road 26 (University Avenue) be included in the discussion of safety issues.

Commissioner Ward discussed item D. West 13th Street as a Complete Street and State Road 26 (University Avenue), South 2nd Avenue and South 4th Avenue for the University of Florida to East 25 Street.

Commissioner Prizzia discussed the need for discussion of pedestrian safety concerns on the State Highway System.

Mayor Poe discussed safety needs, limited resources and the need for a transportation surtax. He suggested a countywide transportation equity workshop/town hall meeting.

Commissioner Ward discussed item C. Lighted Signal Crossing On The State Highway System, noting that enhanced lighting is being installed on State Road 24 (Waldo Road); item B. First-Mile and Last Mile Study, which he reviewed; and item A. Regional Transit System Fare Structure.

Lee Feldman, City Manager, City of Gainesville, discussed implementation of a fare-free transit structure for persons under 18-years old, 65-years old and older, and disabled persons, and bus vehicle replacement costs for the City of Gainesville Regional Transit System.

Ms. Young spoke in support of the fare-free transit structure for persons under 18-years old, 65-years old and older, and disabled persons for the City of Gainesville Regional Transit System.

MOTION: Commissioner Ward moved have a joint Alachua County-City of Gainesville-funded pilot project undertaken for a fare-free transit structure for persons under 18-years old, persons 65-years old and older, and disabled persons for the City of Gainesville Regional Transit System. Commissioner Prizzia seconded; Mr. Koons conducted a roll call vote.

Good Afternoon,

My daughter and I have been friends with Sophia Lambert and her family for over 12 years. Sophia, as all attending this MTPO meeting, are likely aware, was the latest victim from UF killed on University Ave. Her death has once again highlighted the lack of safety measures for pedestrians on and around roads and sidewalks near campus and adjoining areas. Sadly, it appears, this issue has been well known and well documented.

As a parent- this is our worst nightmare. The grief Sophia's family feels as well as her friends is overwhelming. Sophia and my daughter were in Girl Scouts together and grew closer this past year as freshman at UF. We are devasted and heart broken. The world has lost a beautiful soul whose mission was simply to "do good".

Thousands of Alachua County residents have joined with parents, students, faculty, and staff from the University of Florida and Santa Fe College to form Gators Against Student Pedestrian Deaths (GASPD) to call for immediate and long term action to save lives in partnership with Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation (GCAT) a local advocacy group for transportation safety.

Urgent action is needed to improve bike/ped safety in Gainesville. The State of Florida, City of Gainesville, Alachua County, and the University of Florida MUST work together in order to make progress. The most dangerous roads in Alachua County for ALL users are State-owned roads and the State of Florida and FDOT MUST step-up in order to make real progress on traffic safety. Current bills proposed in the Florida Legislature are narrow and do not address the issues at hand.

Redesigning University Avenue and 13th Street as "Complete Streets" is the best long-term solution to decreasing bicycle and pedestrian deaths along these corridors.

Complete Streets are defined by US DOT as streets designed and operated to enable safe use and support mobility for all users. Those include people of all ages and abilities, regardless of whether they are travelling as drivers, pedestrians, bicyclists, or public transportation riders. The concept of Complete Streets encompasses many approaches to planning, designing, and operating roadways and rights of way with all users in mind to make the transportation network safer and more efficient. Given the need for FDOT cooperation and millions of dollars of funding, this will likely take years to implement — as parents we can't help but wonder who may be next if changes don't occur more rapidly. Therefore as parents and advocates we hope to see the following:

- 1) Implement Complete Street Designs and lower speed limits to 20 mph in some areas on:
 - a) University Ave
 - b) 13th St

- 2) If needed, shift road ownership from State of Florida to City of Gainesville with funding from State, County, and UF.
- 3) Construct segregated cycle-tracks along University AVE as recommended in the 2015 traffic study.
- 4) Add additional pedestrian-scale lighting

Add bicycle facilities

Enhance pedestrian safety measures with additional and safer crosswalks and safer sidewalks, redesigning and painting roads for narrower or less lanes (road diets) and other traffic calming measures.

early. University Avenue. 13th Street, and other roads around the University of Florida are not complete streets. These corridors were designed as state highways to move motor vehicles through Gainesville as quickly and efficiently as possible. Speed limits are high and bike/ped facilities are limited despite much of the corridors traveling through urban centers filled with people traveling by bicycle and on foot.

hile we are pleased with some of the Florida Department of Transportation's recently announced safety measures including the installation of speed tables, education and awareness campaigns and reducing vehicle speeds to 25 mph on University Avenue, along with installing new signalized mid-block crosswalks for pedestrians, we feel these efforts must go farther and move faster to ensure not one more student is killed. Of concern also is that while increased policing may seem like an appropriate response, it is not a sustainable solution and tragically sometimes not an equitable one.

Thank you all for your commitment in addressing our concerns.

A RESOLUTION OF THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION FOR THE GAINESVILLE URBANIZED AREA AMENDING THE FISCAL YEARS 2020-21 AND 2021-22 UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM INCREASING THE AMOUNT OF FEDERAL TRANSIT ADMINISTRATION SECTION 5305(d) GRANT FUNDS BY \$17,786 FOR FISCAL YEAR 2021-22 AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO APPROVE PLANNING ACTIVITY MODIFICATIONS THAT DO NOT CHANGE THE OVERALL BUDGET OR SCOPE OF WORK TASKS REGARDING FISCAL YEAR 2020-21 AND FISCAL YEAR 2021-22 PLANNING FUNDS IN ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area, as a designated Metropolitan Planning Organization, is entitled to receive Fiscal Years 2020-21 and 2021-22 Federal Highway Administration metropolitan planning funds in Alachua County in order to develop, in cooperation with the state and public transit operators, transportation plans and programs for the Gainesville Metropolitan Area: that provide for the development and integrated management and operation of transportation systems and facilities, including pedestrian walkways and bicycle transportation facilities; that utilize a process for developing such plans that provides consideration of all modes of transportation; that shall be continuing, cooperative and comprehensive, to the degree appropriate, based on the complexity of transportation problems to be addressed; that ensure that the process is integrated with the statewide planning process; and that identify transportation facilities that should function as an integrated metropolitan transportation system, giving emphasis to facilities that serve important national, state and regional transportation functions, including those facilities on the Strategic Intermodal System as designated under Section 339.63, Florida Statutes.

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area, as a designated metropolitan planning organization, shall develop, in cooperation with the Florida Department of Transportation and public transportation providers, a unified planning work program that lists all planning tasks to be undertaken during Fiscal Year 2020-21 and Fiscal Year 2021-22 that must provide a complete description of each planning task and an estimated budget therefor and must comply with applicable state and federal law; and

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area has prepared the Fiscal Years 2020-21 and 2021-22 Unified Planning Work Program that includes required Assurances and Certifications and will then seek reimbursement of funds for implementation of said unified planning work program from the Florida Department of Transportation.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION FOR THE GAINESVILLE URBANIZED AREA:

- 1. That the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area has the authority to approve the Fiscal Years 2020-21 and 2021-22 Unified Planning Work Program.
- 2. That the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area approves and authorizes its Chair to sign the Fiscal Years 2020-21 and 2021-22 Unified Planning Work Program on behalf of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area in order to implement metropolitan planning work tasks and activities in and affecting Alachua County, Florida (Federal Project Identification Number- 0241-058-M).

That the Fiscal Year 2020-21 Unified Planning Work Program estimated budget includes eight hundred forty-three thousand six hundred sixty-eight dollars and no cents (\$843,668.00) which represents six hundred eighty-three thousand eight hundred forty-three dollars and no cents (\$683,843.00) Federal Highway Administration funds and one hundred fifty thousand eight hundred twenty-five dollars and no cents (\$150,825.00) state soft matching funds for Fiscal Year 2020-21 (Florida Department of Transportation Project Identification Number- 439318-3-14-01).

That the amount of reimbursement for federal highway planning is not to exceed six hundred eighty-three thousand four hundred and eighty-one dollars and no cents (\$683,483.00) in Fiscal Year 2020-21 and four hundred eighty-three thousand eight hundred forty-three dollars and no cents (\$483,843.00) in Fiscal Year 2021-22 which represents the Federal Highway Administration portion for unified planning work program implementation.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Approve Resolution No. 2021-06 (Exhibit 1) authorizing Transportation Improvement Program amendment emergency approval by the Chair and Executive Director.

BACKGROUND

Due to the Covid-19 Public Health Emergency, Resolution No. 2020-02 adopted by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization on April 20, 2020 authorizes Transportation Improvement Program amendment approval by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization Chair and Executive Director during periods of federal, state or local declared emergencies. This authority was used recently for the following Florida Department of Transportation-requested emergency Transportation Improvement Program amendments to add two projects:

- Federal Transit Administration Section 5339 Operating Grant award in Fiscal Year 2020-21; and
- Interstate 75 (State Road 93) right-of-way acquisition in Fiscal Years 2020-21 and 2021-22.

However, Florida Department of Transportation-requested emergency Transportation Improvement Program amendments that do not occur during periods of federal, state or local declared emergencies are not be subject to the emergency authority granted by Resolution No. 2020-02. Staff recommends establishment of emergency authority for periods when federal, state or local declared emergencies are not in effect. Resolution No. 2021-06 addresses emergency approval by the Chair and Executive Director for Florida Department of Transportation Work Program/State Transportation Improvement Program projects that would be adversely impacted by conforming to the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization regular meeting schedule.

All emergency-approved Transportation Improvement Program amendments will be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization meeting for ratification by the full membership of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization.

WHEREAS, pursuant to 23 Untied States Code 134, 23 Code of Regulations 450, and Section 339.175, Florida Statutes, require the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and the Florida Department of Transportation to enter into an agreement clearly identifying the responsibilities for cooperatively carrying out the Federal Highway Administration portion of the metropolitan planning process and accomplishing the transportation planning requirements of state and federal law; and

In response to a Florida Department of Transportation notification of need for an Emergency Transportation Improvement Program Amendment, the Executive Director of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area, with the approval of the Chair of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area or Vice-Chair of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area in the absence of the Chair is hereby authorized to:

- a. Amend the Transportation Improvement Program document to maintain consistency with state or federal programs, or amend program or project funding if the time constraint is such that action at the next scheduled meeting of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area would significantly delay progress on a project previously supported by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area;
- b. Approve amendments to the Transportation Improvement Program, provided that the process for seeking approval of these actions shall follow all applicable procedures and is consistent with the adopted long-range transportation plan;

OVERVIEW

This document highlights key provisions of Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) performance management requirements for state Departments of Transportation, Metropolitan Planning Organizations, and transit providers, including target setting, performance reporting, and deadlines.

PLANNING RULE FRAMEWORK

FHWA and FTA jointly issued a Planning Rule to document changes in the statewide and metropolitan planning processes consistent with the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century (MAP-21) Act and the Fixing America's Surface Transportation

(FAST) Act. Among other changes, this rule specifies the requirements for state DOTs and MPOs to implement a performance-based approach to planning and programming. Under this framework, the three FHWA performance measures (PM) rules and the FTA transit asset management and transit safety rules established various performance measures to assess roadway safety (PM1), pavement and bridge condition (PM2), system performance and freight movement (PM3), transit asset management (TAM), and transit safety. The Planning Rule and the performance measures rules also specify how MPOs should set targets, report performance, and integrate performance management into their Long-Range Transportation Plans (LRTP) and Transportation Improvement Programs (TIP).

Long-Range Transportation Plans

The Planning Rule specifies how performance management is incorporated into the MPO's LRTP. The LRTP must:

- » Describe the performance measures and performance targets used in assessing the performance of the transportation system.
- » Include a System Performance Report that:
 - Evaluates the condition and performance of the transportation system with respect to performance targets.
 - Documents the progress achieved by the MPO in meeting the targets in comparison to performance recorded in past reports.
- Integrate the goals, objectives, performance measures, and targets described in all the plans and processes required as part of a performance-based program.

Transportation Improvement Programs

The TIP must:

- » Reflect the investment priorities established in the current long-range transportation plan.
- » Be designed such that in the once implemented, it makes progress toward achieving the performance targets established.
- » Include, to the maximum extent practicable, a description of the anticipated effect of the TIP toward achieving the performance targets identified in the LRTP, linking investment priorities to those performance targets.

TARGET SETTING OPTIONS

TIMELINE FOR MPO ACTIONS

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), the MPOs, and providers of public transportation set their respective performance targets in coordination with one another. Each MPO establishes a target for each applicable performance measure. MPOs should propose, seek comment on, and establish their targets through existing processes such as the TIP. For the **PM1**, **PM2**, and **PM3** measures, each MPO establishes targets by one of two options:

Support the statewide target established by FDOT.

If the MPO chooses to support the statewide target, the MPO provides documentation to FDOT stating that the MPO agrees to plan and program projects so that they contribute toward the accomplishment of FDOT's statewide target for that performance measure.

OR

Establish own target.

If the MPO chooses to establish its own target, the MPO coordinates with FDOT regarding the approach used to develop the target and the proposed target prior to establishing a final target. The MPO provides documentation to FDOT that includes the final target and the date the MPO established the target.

MPOs must establish their targets no later than 180 days after FDOT sets its target.

For the **transit asset management and safety measures**, MPOs may support the targets established by transit providers or establish their own targets. Initial action by the MPO must take place within 180 days of the transit provider action to establish targets. MPOs may then update these targets when they update their TIP or LRTP.

ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS

FHWA will not assess MPO target achievement. However, FHWA and FTA will review MPO adherence to performance management requirements as part of periodic transportation planning process reviews, including the Transportation Management Area (TMA) MPO certification reviews, reviews of adopted and amended LRTPs, and approval of MPO TIPs.

OVERVIEW

The first of the performance measures rules issued by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) became effective on April 14, 2016, establishing measures to assess the condition of road safety. This fact sheet summarizes the requirements of this rule, the targets that the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) selected to meet them, and the role of the Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) under this rule.*

PERFORMANCE MEASURES - APPLICABLE TO ALL PUBLIC ROADS

NUMBER OF FATALITIES

The total number of persons suffering fatal injuries in a motor vehicle crash during a calendar year.

RATE OF FATALITIES

The total number of fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled (VMT) in a calendar year.

NUMBER OF SERIOUS INJURIES

The total number of persons suffering at least one serious injury in a motor vehicle crash during a calendar year.

RATE OF SERIOUS INJURIES

The total number of serious injuries per 100 million VMT in a calendar year.

NUMBER OF NON-MOTORIZED FATALITIES AND NON-MOTORIZED SERIOUS INJURIES The combined total number of non-motorized fatalities and non-motorized serious injuries involving a motor vehicle during a calendar year.

COORDINATION WITH OTHER PLANS

Updates to FDOT's Florida Transportation Plan (FTP) and MPO's Long-Range Transportation Plans (LRTP) must include most recently reported safety performance data and targets.


Updates to the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) and Transportation Improvement Programs (TIP) must include a description of how the STIP/TIP contributes to achieving safety performance targets in the FTP/LRTP.

EXISTING STATEWIDE CONDITIONS



STATEWIDE TARGETS

- » FDOT annually establishes statewide safety targets for the following calendar year as part of the HSIP Annual Report, which must be submitted by August 31 each year.
- » Targets are applicable to all public roads regardless of functional classification or ownership.

Given FDOT's firm belief that every life counts, the target set for all safety performance measures is ZERO.

MPO TARGETS

MPOs have the option of supporting the statewide targets or establishing their own targets for the MPO planning area. MPOs must set their targets within 180 days after FDOT sets the statewide targets. MPOs must annually update their targets by February 27 of each year.

ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS

FHWA considers a state to have met or made significant progress when at least four out of the five safety performance targets are met or the actual outcome for the safety performance target is better than baseline performance.

Based on FHWA's review, Florida is making progress towards achieving the targets established for serious injuries but not yet for fatalities or non-motorized users. As requested by FHWA, FDOT has developed an HSIP Implementation Plan to highlight additional strategies it will undertake in support of these targets.

FHWA will not assess MPO target achievement. However, FHWA and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) will review MPO adherence to performance management requirements as part of periodic transportation planning process reviews, including the Transportation Management Area (TMA) MPO certification reviews, reviews of adopted and amended LRTPs, and approval of MPO TIPs.

OVERVIEW

The second of the performance measures rules issued by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) became effective on May 20, 2017, establishing measures to assess the condition of the pavements and bridges on the National Highway System (NHS). This fact sheet summarizes the requirements of this rule, the targets Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) selected to meet them, and the role of the Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) under this rule.*

PAVEMENT PERFORMANCE MEASURES

- » Percentage of pavements on the Interstate System in GOOD condition.
- » Percentage of pavements on the Interstate System in POOR condition.
- » Percentage of pavements on the non-Interstate NHS in GOOD condition.
- » Percentage of pavements on the non-Interstate NHS in POOR condition.

GOOD CONDITION

Suggests no major investment is needed.

BRIDGE PERFORMANCE MEASURES

- » Percentage of NHS bridges (by deck area) classified as in GOOD condition.
- » Percentage of NHS bridges (by deck area) classified as in POOR condition.

POOR CONDITION

Süggests major investment is needed.



STATEWIDE TARGETS

FDOT established 2- and 4-year targets on May 18, 2018 for the full extent of the NHS in Florida. Two-year targets reflect the anticipated performance level at the mid point of each performance period, while 4-year targets reflect it for the end of the performance period.

Note: Two-year targets were not required for Interstate pavement condition for the first performance period, but will be required for the second and subsequent performance periods.

MPO TARGETS

MPOs have the option of supporting the statewide targets or establishing their own targets for the MPO planning area. MPOs must set their targets within 180 days after FDOT sets the statewide targets. MPOs set pavement and bridge targets for the first performance period by November 14, 2018. FDOT will set the targets for the second 4-year performance period by October 1, 2022, after which the MPOs will have 180 days to set their targets.

ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS

Beginning in 2020 and continuing every two years thereafter, FHWA will determine if FDOT has made significant progress toward the achievement of each 2-year or 4-year applicable statewide target if either:

- » The actual condition/performance level is better than the baseline condition/performance; or
- » The actual condition/performance level is equal to or better than the established target.

In January 2021, FHWA determined Florida had made significant progress toward the two-year bridge and pavement targets based on reported data for 2018 and 2019. FHWA will not directly assess MPO progress toward meeting their targets. Rather, it will do so through the periodic transportation planning reviews, including the Transportation Management Area (TMA) MPO certification reviews and reviews of adopted/amended LRTPs and TIPs.

MINIMUM CONDITIONS

Every year, FHWA will assess if FDOT is meeting the statewide minimum condition requirements. If it is not, FDOT must obligate funds to meet minimum requirements.

FDOT IS ON TRACK TO MEET MINIMUM CONDITION REQUIREMENTS

Pavement: No more than 5 percent of the Interstate System in Poor condition for most recent year.



» Bridge: No more than 10 percent of total deck area of NHS bridges classified as Structurally Deficient (Poor condition) for three consecutive years.

OVERVIEW


The third of the three performance measures rules issued by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) became effective on May 20, 2017, establishing measures to assess the performance of the National Highway System (NHS), freight movement on the Interstate System, and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ). This fact sheet summarizes the requirements of this rule, the targets that the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) selected to meet them, and the role of the Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) under this rule.*

PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Performance Measure	Typically Referred to As	What It Measures
Percent of person-miles traveled on the Interstate that are reliable	Interstate reliability	Seeks to assess how reliable the NHS network is by creating a ratio (called Level of Travel Time Reliability, or LOTTR) that compares the worst travel times on a road
Percent of person-miles traveled on the non- Interstate NHS that are reliable	Non-Interstate reliability	against the travel time that is typically experienced. Road miles with a LOTTR less than 1.5 are considered reliable. Traffic volume and an average vehicle occupancy are factored in to determine the person miles that are reliable, and this is converted to a percent of total miles.
Truck travel time reliability (TTTR) index	Truck reliability	Seeks to assess how reliable the Interstate network is for trucks by creating a ratio (called Truck Travel Time Reliability, or TTTR) that compares the very worst travel times for trucks against the travel time they typically experience.

This rule also contains measures addressing CMAQ Program. These are applicable only for areas that are designated as nonattainment or maintenance, of which Florida currently has none. Therefore, they are currently not applicable to FDOT or any of Florida's MPOs.

FDOT established the following 2- and 4-year targets on May 18, 2018. Two-year targets reflect the anticipated performance level at the end of calendar year 2019, while 4-year targets reflect anticipated performance at the end of 2021.

MPO TARGETS

MPOs have the option of supporting the statewide targets or establishing their own targets for the MPO planning area. MPOs must set their targets within 180 days after FDOT sets the statewide targets. MPOs set system performance targets for the first performance period by November 14, 2018. FDOT will set its targets for the second 4-year performance period by October 1, 2022, after which the MPOs will have 180 days to set their targets.

ASSESSMENT OF SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS

Beginning in 2020 and continuing every two years thereafter, FHWA will determine that FDOT has made significant progress toward the achievement of each 2-year or 4-year applicable statewide target if either:

- » The actual condition/performance level is better than the baseline condition/performance; or
- » The actual condition/performance level is equal to or better than the established target.

In January 2021, FHWA determined Florida had made significant progress toward the two-year targets for Interstate and truck reliability based on reported data. If FDOT does not make significant progress toward achieving a reliability target, it must document the actions it will take to achieve the target. For the truck reliability measure, it must provide additional freight analysis and documentation.

FHWA will not assess MPO target achievement. However, FHWA and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) will review MPO adherence to performance management requirements as part of periodic transportation planning process reviews, including the Transportation Management Area (TMA) MPO certification reviews, reviews of updated and amended Long-Range Transportation Plans (LRTP), and approval of MPO Transportation Improvement Programs (TIP).

TRANSIT Asset Management

OVERVIEW

The Transit Asset Management rule from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) became effective on October 1, 2016. This rule applies to all recipients and subrecipients of federal transit funding that own, operate, or manage public transportation capital assets. The rule introduces requirements for new State of Good Repair (SGR) performance measures and Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plans. This fact sheet describes these requirements and the role of the Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) under this rule.

STATE OF GOOD REPAIR PERFORMANCE MEASURES

Transit agencies are required to report transit asset performance measures and targets annually to the National Transit Database (NTD). Targets should be supported by the most recent condition data and reasonable financial projections.

Transit Asset Categories and Related Performance Measures

FTA Asset Categories	Type of Measure	Performance Measures
EQUIPMENT Non-revenue support-service and maintenance vehicles	Age	Percentage of non-revenue, support-service and maintenance vehicles that have met or exceeded their useful life benchmark (ULB)
ROLLING STOCK Revenue vehicles	Age	Percentage of revenue vehicles within a particular asset class that have either met or exceeded their ULB
INFRASTRUCTURE Rail fixed-guideway track	Performance	Percentage of track segments (by mode) with performance restrictions
FACILITIES Buildings and structures	Condition	Percentage of facilities within an asset class rated below condition 3 on the Transit Economic Requirement Model (TERM) scale

"State of good repair" is defined as the condition in which a capital asset is able to operate at a full level of performance. This means the asset:

- Is able to perform its designed function.
- 2. Does not pose a known unacceptable safety risk.
- Lifecycle investments have been met or recovered.

TIMELINE



TAM PLAN

By October 1, 2018 (two years from effective date of the Final Rule), Transit Asset Management Plans (TAM Plan) were required for all providers. These plans are either developed by the providers or by a group sponsor on behalf of multiple providers. These plan must be updated every four years. The Group TAM Plan must be updated by October 1, 2022, and individual TAM Plans by Tier I and Tier II providers must be updated by the start of the provider's fiscal year.

Tier I versus Tier II Agencies

The rule makes a distinction between Tier I and Tier II transit providers and establishes different requirements for them.

TIER

Owns, operates, or manages either:

> = 101 vehicles in revenue service during peak regular service across ALL fixed route modes or ANY one non-fixed route mode

OR

Rail transit

TIER II

Owns, operates, or manages either:

< = 100 vehicles in revenue
service during peak regular
service across ALL non-rall fixed
route modes or in ANY one
non-rall fixed route mode

OR

Subrecipient under the 5311 program

A TIER I provider must develop its own TAM Plan. The Tier I provider must make the TAM plan, annual targets, and supporting materials available to the state DOTs and MPOs that provide funding to the provider.

TIER II agencies may develop their own plans or participate in a group TAM plan, which is compiled by a group TAM plan sponsor. State Departments of Transportation (DOT) that pass FTA funds to subrecipients are required to be group TAM plan sponsors. The unified targets and narrative report for group plan participants are submitted on behalf of all participating agencies by the sponsor. Group plan sponsors must make the group plan, targets, and supporting materials available to the state DOTs and MPOs that program projects for any participants of the group plan. The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) developed a group plan for all subrecipients in 2018. The plan included collective targets for subrecipients.

MPO COORDINATION

Each public transit provider or its sponsors must share its targets with each MPO in which the transit provider operates services. MPOs are required to establish initial transit asset management targets within 180 days of the date that public transportation providers establish initial targets. However, MPOs are not required to establish transit asset management targets annually each time the transit provider establishes targets. Instead, subsequent MPO targets must be established when the MPO updates the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) or Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP). When establishing transit asset management targets, the MPO can either agree to program projects that will support the transit provider's targets, or establish its own separate regional targets for the MPO planning area. MPO targets may differ from provider targets, especially if there are multiple transit agencies in the MPO planning area. MPOs are required to coordinate with transit providers and group plan sponsors when selecting targets to ensure alignment of targets.

FTA will not assess MPO progress toward achieving transit targets. However, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and FTA will review MPO adherence to performance management requirements as part of periodic transportation planning process reviews, including the Transportation Management Area (TMA) MPO certification reviews, reviews of updated LRTPs, and approval of MPO TIPs.

PUBLIC TRANSIT Safety Performance

OVERVIEW

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) has established requirements through 49 CFR 673 for Public Transportation Agency Safety Plans (PTASP) and related performance measures as authorized by the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (MAP–21). This rule requires certain operators of public transportation systems that receive federal financial assistance under 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53 to develop and implement PTASP based on a Safety Management Systems (SMS) approach. Development and implementation of agency safety plans will help ensure that public transportation systems are safe nationwide. This fact sheet summarizes the requirements of this rule and the responsibilities of Florida's transit providers and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) in implementing the rule.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AGENCY SAFETY PLANS (PTASP)

Federal Rule Applicability

RECIPIENTS AND SUB-RECIPIENTS OF FTA 5307 FUNDS FTA is deferring applicability for operators that only receive 5310 and/or 5311 funds.



PTASP CERTIFICATION AND REVIEW

RELATIONSHIP OF PTASP TO FLORIDA REQUIREMENTS

Florida requires each Section 5307 and/or 5311 transit provider to have an adopted System Safety Program Plan (SSPP) (Chapter 14-90, Florida Administrative Code). The FTA PTASP rule and Florida's SSPP requirements are similar, but have some differences. Because Section 5307 providers in Florida must already have a SSPP, FDOT recommends that transit agencies revise their existing SSPPs to be compliant with the new FTA PTASP requirements.

FDOT has issued guidance to providers to assist them with revising existing SSPPs to be compliant with the FTA requirements.

While the PTASP rule requires transit providers to establish safety performance targets, the SSPP does not.

REQUIREMENTS

COORDINATION WITH METROPOLITAN, STATEWIDE, AND NON-METROPOLITAN PLANNING PROCESSES

- » Public transit providers will coordinate with FDOT and affected MPOs in the selection of transit safety performance targets.
- » Providers will give written notice to the MPO(s) and FDOT when the provider establishes transit safety targets. This notice will provide the established targets and the date of establishment.
- » MPOs that establish their own transit safety targets will coordinate with the public transit provider(s) and FDOT in the selection of transit safety performance targets. The MPOs will give written notice to the public transit providers and FDOT when the MPO establishes its own transit safety targets.
- » MPOs that agree to support a public transit provider's safety targets will provide FDOT and the public transit providers documentation that the MPO agrees to do so.

- » Public transit providers that annually draft and certify a PTASP must make the PTASP and underlying safety performance data available to FDOT and the MPOs to aid in the planning process.
- » Public transit providers will update the PTASP and establish transit safety targets annually. MPOs are not required to establish transit safety targets annually. Instead, subsequent MPO transit safety targets must be established when the MPO updates the TIP or LRTP.
- » If two or more providers operate in an MPO planning area and establish different safety targets for a measure, the MPO may establish a single target for the MPO planning area or establish a set of targets for the MPO planning area that reflect the differing transit provider targets.



Citizens Advisory Committee members shall not be elected officials or Alachua County staff, City of Gainesville staff, including Regional Transit System staff, and North Central Florida regional Planning Council staff personnel directly involved in transportation planning.

Note: There is no policy regarding how many times a member may serve on the Committee.

VOTING PROCEDURE

The voting policy that was approved in October 2001 is to always appoint Advisory Committee members by roll-call vote by voice and, when there are several vacant positions to fill, also fill out ballots and submit them to staff for tabulation.

In accordance with the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization Bylaws, Citizens Advisory Committee candidates not appointed to the Citizens Advisory Committee may serve as a Citizens Advisory Committee Designate for one year. Citizens Advisory Committee Designates will automatically fill any vacancy during the year.
