CALL TO ORDER

Chair Wells called the meeting to order at 5:04 p.m.

I. APPROVAL OF THE MEETING AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Chair Wells asked for approval of the consent agenda and meeting agenda.

MOTION: Commissioner Hawkins moved to approve the Consent Agenda and Meeting Agenda modified to place CA.5 Archer Road at SW 34th Street Modifications after item VII. Regional Transit System Alternatives Analysis Study. Commissioner Byerly seconded.

Ms. Betsy Hurst noted her concerns regarding item CA. 6 SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path 60 Percent Design Plans.

AMENDED MOTION:

Commissioner Hawkins moved to approve the Consent Agenda and Meeting Agenda modified to place CA.5 Archer Road at SW 34th Street Modifications after item VII. Regional Transit System Alternatives Analysis Study and to place CA. 6 SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path 60 percent Design Plans after CA.5 Archer Road at SW 34th Street Modifications. Commissioner Byerly seconded; motion passed unanimously.

II. CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE- VACANT POSITION

Mr. Marlie Sanderson, Director of Transportation Planning for the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area stated that one vacant position needs to be filled on the Citizens Advisory Committee. He said that one position has a term of office through December 31, 2013. He noted that there were two candidates who live outside the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area boundary.

Chair Wells asked if there were any applicants present to speak concerning their candidacy.

Mr. Chris Towne, Ms. Jeanne Rochford, Mr. Luis Diaz and Mr. Gilbert Levy spoke regarding their candidacy for this Committee.

Mr. Sanderson conducted a voice rollcall ballot for the candidates and reported the results.

MOTION: Commissioner Byerly moved to appoint Luis Diaz to the Citizens Advisory Committee for a term through December 31, 2013. Commissioner Bottcher seconded; motion passed unanimously.

III. CERTIFICATION OF THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROCESS

Mr. Sanderson reported that each year the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area is required to certify that it is in compliance with the federal requirements for the metropolitan transportation planning process.

MOTION: Commissioner Bottcher moved to authorize the Chair to sign the Joint Certification Statement. Commissioner Baird seconded; motion passed unanimously.

IV. TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM AMENDMENTS FOR FISCAL YEARS 2012-13 TO 2016-17

Mr. Sanderson stated that the Florida Department of Transportation has requested amendments to the Fiscal Years 2012/2013 - 2016/2017 Transportation Improvement Program to address right-of-way activity for the three University of Florida Campus Greenway segments of the Archer Braid Trail Project.

MOTION: Commissioner Pinkoson moved to amend the Fiscal Years 2012/2013-2016/2017 Transportation Improvement Program to add right-of-way to the:

- University of Florida Campus Greenway Project from Hull Road Parking Lot to SW 34th Street (State Road 121) [FIN #4322421];
- University of Florida Campus Greenway Project from SW 34th Street (State Road 121) to Gale Lemerand Drive [FIN #4288951]; and
- University of Florida Campus Greenway Project from Gale Lemerand Drive to Archer Road (State Road 24) [FIN #4306141].

Commissioner Bottcher seconded. Mr. Sanderson conducted a show-of-hands vote; motion passed unanimously.

V. TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM FOR FISCAL YEARS 2013-14 TO 2017-18

Mr. Sanderson stated that the Transportation Improvement Program is the most important document that is approved each year. He said that the Transportation Improvement Program is a staged implementation program of transportation projects consistent, to the maximum extent feasible, with adopted comprehensive plans of Alachua County and the City of Gainesville. He added that, in order for Federal transportation funds to be spent in the Gainesville Metropolitan Area, they must be approved by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and included in this report. He noted that this year's document authorizes about \$26 million in Federal funds for projects within the Gainesville Metropolitan Area over the next fiscal year.

He discussed recommended modifications to the draft Transportation Improvement Program in Exhibit B that were discussed at the Advisory Committee meetings.

Mr. James Bennett, Florida Department of Transportation District 2 Urban Transportation Engineer, discussed the State Road 226 Transportation System Management Project and answered questions.

Ms. Teresa Scott, City of Gainesville Public Works Director, discussed the Main Street Roundabout Project.

Mr. Sanderson discussed the Year 2035 Needs Plan and answered questions.

Mr. Jesus Gomez, Regional Transit System Director, discussed transit projects and answered questions.

A member requested an analysis of funding by mode.

MOTION: Commissioner Hawkins moved to:

- 1. approve the Fiscal Years 2013-14 to 2017-18 Transportation Improvement Program with the modifications in Exhibit B; and
- 2. request that staff provide an analysis of funding by mode at the next meeting.

Commissioner Bottcher seconded.

MOTION: Mayor Braddy moved to divide the question by separating out the Transit Maintenance Facility State Infrastructure Bank Loan Repayment Project in Exhibit B. Commissioner Baird seconded; motion passed 7 to 3.

Mr. Dave Schwartz, MTPO Attorney, discussed the procedure to divide the question.

Mr. Jim Maruniak discussed his safety concerns regarding sliplanes.

Mr. Bennett noted that, if the Transit Maintenance Facility State Infrastructure Bank Loan Repayment Project is not included in the Transportation Improvement Program, then the State Infrastructure Bank Loan would not be awarded.

DIVIDED MOTION- PART ONE:

Commissioner Hawkins moved to:

- 1. approve the Fiscal Years 2013-14 to 2017-18 Transportation Improvement Program with the modifications in Exhibit B, except the Transit Maintenance Facility State Infrastructure Bank Loan Repayment Project; and
- 2. request that staff provide updated transportation mode funding information for the material included in the August 6, 2012 meeting packet.

Commissioner Bottcher seconded. Chair Wells conducted a show-of-hands vote; motion passed 7 to 3.

DIVIDED MOTION- PART TWO:

Commissioner Hawkins moved to approve the Transit Maintenance Facility SIB Loan Repayment Project. Commissioner Bottcher seconded. Chair Wells conducted a show-of-hands vote; motion passed 8 to 2.

VI. LIST OF PRIORITY PROJECTS

Mr. Sanderson stated that, each year, priorities for unfunded projects are developed. He said that these priorities are used by the Florida Department of Transportation to develop its Tentative Work Program. He added that this year's draft List of Priority Projects includes projects from the adopted Year 2035 Livable Community Reinvestment Plan and from local agency recommendations. He discussed the draft tables and answered questions.

Mr. Jeff Hays, Alachua County Transportation Planning Manager, discussed the Newberry Road Parkand-Ride Project.

Ms. Scott discussed the Depot Avenue Reconstruction project.

A member suggested that the City and County develop lists of projects to be considered for long range transportation plan amendments.

Mr. Sanderson reported the status of the Year 2040 long range transportation plan update.

Mr. Bennett discussed the long range transportation plan amendment process and costs related to amending the long range transportation plan. He noted that the Archer Road Project Development and Environmental Study is out-of-date and would need to be updated.

A member requested leaving out Table 11 Priority 5 until after that project is discussed later.

MOTION: Commissioner Poe moved to:

- 1. approve the List of Priority Projects, except for Table 11 Priority 5; and
- 2. direct staff to place on the agenda for an upcoming meeting to consider whether or not to amend the Year 2035 long range transportation plan and, if there is a recommendation to amend the long range transportation plan, then to provide candidate project lists developed by City and County staff that include fiscal impacts and funding sources for the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area to prioritize.

Commissioner Byerly seconded; motion passed unanimously.

After Mr. Sanderson noted that there were still action items from the Consent Agenda, Chair Wells stated that CA. 6 SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path- 60 Percent Design Plans would be discussed next.

CA. 6 SW 8TH AVENUE MULTI-USE PATH- 60 PERCENT DESIGN PLANS

Ms. Betsy Hurst discussed her concerns that the SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path would exacerbate flooding conditions in the SW 91st Street area.

Mr. Chris Towne, Dyer Riddle Mills and Precourt Traffic Engineer, discussed the SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path- 60 Percent Design Plans and answered questions.

Mr. Diaz also discussed the flooding concerns regarding the SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path.

MOTION: Commissioner Pinkoson moved to:

- 1. approve the SW 8th Avenue Multi-Use Path 60 percent Design Plans; and
- 2. request that Alachua County address the flooding concerns presented by Ms. Hurst.

Commissioner Bottcher seconded; motion passed 8 to 1 with Commissioner Baird voting "No."

CA. 5 ARCHER ROAD AT SW 34TH STREET INTERSECTION MODIFICATIONS

Mr. Bennett discussed the Archer Road at SW 34th Street Intersection Modifications report and answered questions. He noted that Florida Department of Transportation District 2 Traffic Operations staff and its consultant were present.

Mr. Mark Manwell, England Thims and Miller Traffic Engineer, discussed the Archer Road at SW 34th Street Intersection Modifications report and answered questions.

MOTION: Commissioner Poe moved to approve the Florida Department of Transportation State Road 24 (Archer Road) at State Road 121 (SW 34th Street) Technical Report conclusions (page 22). Commissioner Baird seconded.

Mr. Bennett stated that the Florida Department of Transportation's involvement with the Butler Plaza development would be only for access development permits.

Mr. Bennett stated that the Florida Department of Transportation would provide the Technical Report appendices with the pedestrian data.

A member asked about provisions for enhanced pedestrian signage.

Mr. Manwell discussed the travel time savings with the proposed Florida Department of Transportation recommendations.

SUBSTITUTE MOTION:

Commissioner Hutchinson moved to defer discussion on this agenda item, request additional pedestrian count information and request recommendations concerning modifications that will make the area less hostile to pedestrians.

Commissioner Hawkins seconded; motion passed unanimously.

A member suggested deferring the remaining items to the next meeting. He also noted that the Archer Road and Tower Road issues have already been discussed.

Another member noted his interest in discussing pedestrian crossing markings.

Mr. Bennett stated that he has staff present to address this issue and asked about the locations for pedestrian crossing marking changes. He noted that this topic has been deferred several times and requested that this item be on the agenda for the next meeting.

A member said that he would coordinate with Florida Department of Transportation staff regarding specific locations for the enhanced pedestrian striping modifications.

VII. REGIONAL TRANSIT SYSTEM (RTS) ALTERNATIVES ANALYSIS STUDY

Mr. Sanderson stated that RTS staff requested an opportunity to provide a status report on the alternatives analysis.

Mr. Alan Danaher, Parsons-Brinkerhoff Project Manager, discussed the status of the alternatives analysis and answered questions.

A member requested information about the community characteristics of Gainesville and Eugene.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

The Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Board, Citizens Advisory Committee, Technical Advisory Committee and Staff recommend to approve the submission of two transportation alternative project applications by the City of Gainesville for E. University Avenue and the Norton Elementary Trail (see priorities #2 and #3 in Exhibit 1).

Note- an application was submitted last year for priority #1 in Exhibit 1.

BACKGROUND

According to the Florida Department of Transportation, funding applications this year for transportation alternative projects are due around the end of November. In order to meet this deadline, the following timetable is recommended-

Recommendations are made by the MTPO Advisory Committees concerning two July 24th and 25th-

new projects for funding applications. Last year, an application was submitted for Priority #1- SW 27 Street/SW 40 Place/SW 25 Terrace (see Exhibit 1). Therefore, the next two highest priorities for funding are Priority #2 (E.

University Avenue) and Priority #3 (Norton Elementary Trail).

Late November-

Two Project Applications Submitted.

8.5 Transit Development Planning

a. Purpose

The State of Florida Public Transit Block Grant Program was enacted by the Florida Legislature to provide a stable source of state funding for public transportation. The Block Grant Program requires public transit service providers to develop and adopt a ten-year Transit Development Plan, per the requirements set forth in Rule 14-73, Florida Administrative Code. Annual progress reports also must be submitted to the Florida Department of Transportation by September 1st of each year. A major update is required every five years and the annual progress reports are required in the interim years. The City of Gainesville Regional Transit System's next major update is due September 1, 2014.

b. Previous Work Completed

The City of Gainesville Regional Transit System prepared the 2009 Transit Development Plan.

c. Methodology

The ten-year Transit Development Plan is a strategic guide for public transportation in the community over the next ten years. It represents the transit agency's vision for public transportation in its service area during this time period. Generally, the Transit Development Plan process includes an assessment of overall transit-related needs in the community along with a phased implementation plan of recommended improvements for helping address those needs. Specifically, a Transit Development Plan includes the following major elements:

- Public involvement plan and process;
- Base data compilation and analysis (review of demographic and travel behavior characteristics of the service area);
- Performance evaluation of existing services;
- Situation appraisal (transit agency strengths and weaknesses; external barriers and opportunities; estimation of community demand for transit);
- Goals and objectives;
- Transit demand and mobility needs;
- Development of proposed transit enhancements (funded and unfunded);
- Ten-year implementation plan;
- Ten-year financial plan (projected costs and revenues); and
- Other strategic issues specific to a given study area.

d. End Products

Year One- There are no tasks scheduled for Year One.

Year Two- Anticipated completion date is June 30, 2014.

The Transit Development Plan update process that will be completed by June 30, 2014 will culminate in a plan document that will include the following types of information:

- Demographic, socio-economic, land-use, transportation, and transit data for the study area;
- Public involvement plan (including stakeholder interviews, on-board survey, etc.);
- Capacity/supply evaluation of transit services;
- Peer review analysis;
- Estimate of demand for transit services;
- Key themes and trends from local plans and documents; and
- Ten-year transit plan.

BACKGROUND:

As you know, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area adopts the Unified Planning Work Program which outlines the anticipated transportation planning expenditures each year for the period beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30. However, since the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area is a governmental entity under Florida state law, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area fiscal year begins on October 1. Consequently, a fiscal year budget needs to be adopted that can be monitored and adjusted appropriately during the year as decisions are made with respect to program activities.

The attached amended budget and budget satisfy this budgetary process requirement. One is an amended Fiscal Year 2012-13 budget which reflects the year to date activities of the current year during the first three quarters and an estimate of the revenues and expenditures anticipated during the July-September 2013 quarter. The Fiscal Year 2013-14 budget is based upon the Unified Planning Work Program for the first three quarters and an estimate of revenues and expenditures for the July-September 2014 quarter.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Request that the Alachua County Traffic Safety Team:

- identify modifications that will make the SW 34th Street at Archer Road and SW 34th Street at Windmeadows Boulevard intersections less hostile to pedestrians; and
- 2. incorporate this project into its List of Priority Projects- Safety recommendations for next year (2014).

BACKGROUND

At its June 3, 2013 meeting, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area discussed proposed intersection modifications on SW 34th Street at Archer Road and Windmeadows Boulevard. During this discussion, several members stated their concerns about the impact the proposed modifications would have on pedestrians. At the conclusion of this discussion, the following motion was approved-

"to defer discussion on this agenda item, request additional pedestrian count information and request recommendations concerning modifications that will make the area less hostile to pedestrians."



As shown (for the three peak hours analyzed), entering vehicles account for more than 99% of the traffic at these intersections, while crossing pedestrians account for less than 1%.

I also compared the entire 8-hour counts for both intersections (which gave very similar results): entering vehicles totaled 67,798 (99.17%), while pedestrians totaled 569 (0.83%).






AM Peak Hour (7:30 – 8:30 AM)








Midday Peak Hour (12:15 – 1:15 PM)





JOINT RECOMMENDATION

The Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Board, Citizens Advisory Committee, Technical Advisory Committee and Staff recommend not amending the adopted long range transportation plan at this time, but instead address the project priority for the four-laning of Archer Road along with other transportation project priorities over the next two years as part of the Year 2040 long range transportation plan update.

BACKGROUND

A member of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area has requested the following agenda item
"What would it take and cost to four-lane Archer Road to the City of Archer?"

Archer Road (State Road 24) currently reduces from four lanes to two lanes immediately west of Tower Road. From this point, Archer Road remains a two-lane road for about seven miles to the City of Archer. About 1.5 miles of this road segment is located within the metropolitan planning area boundary.

In order for the Florida Department of Transportation to program funds to four-lane this State Road, this project must be included in the adopted long range transportation plan. The attached Table 65 is a copy of the adopted Year 2035 Roadway Cost Feasible Plan. During the last long range transportation plan update, this needed project did not rank high enough relative to other needed project to be included in Table 65.

The latest Florida Department of Transportation construction cost estimates (not including right-of-way) to add two lanes to a two-lane road is about \$7.4 million per mile. Therefore, the total construction cost estimate for this project is approximately \$52 million. The construction cost estimate for the 1.5 mile portion in the metropolitan planning area boundary is approximately \$11 million. Sufficient right-of-way for the four-laning of Archer Road was purchased about 20 years ago. However, additional right-of-way is expected to be needed for this project to meet current design and drainage standards.

June 3, 2013 Meeting

At the June 3, 2013 meeting, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area discussed this project and approved the following motion:

"to direct staff to place on the agenda for an upcoming meeting to consider whether or not to amend the Year 2035 long range transportation plan and, if there is a recommendation to amend the long range transportation plan, then to provide candidate project lists developed by City and County staff that include fiscal impacts and funding sources for the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area to prioritize."

Conclusion

Staff has researched this issue and <u>concluded that the currently adopted long range transportation plan</u> should not be amended at this time to include this project for the following reasons-

- 1. The long range transportation plan is updated every five years and includes such tasks as: updating goals and objectives; projecting socioeconomic information using the latest information in City of Gainesville and Alachua County Comprehensive Plans; and re-validating the travel demand model. This plan update process addresses transportation issues and projects in a comprehensive and coordinated manner based on the latest policies in locally-adopted comprehensive plans. Since long range plan amendments do not have the benefits of being considered as part of an overall comprehensive transportation planning process, they should be avoided if possible.
- 2. Amending the plan to include this project will not result in the Archer Road project being funded before the next long range transportation plan updated is completed by October 2015. In order to program funds to construct this project, the Florida Department of Transportation will first have to prepare a project development and environmental study and purchase additional right-of-way.

According to Florida Department of Transportation staff, even if the Year 2035 Cost Feasible Plan was amended to give this project the highest priority in the next few months, the earliest that funds can be programmed for the project development and environmental study is Fiscal Year 2016-17. According to the Florida Department of Transportation, waiting to address this project as part of the next update of the long range transportation plan in 2015 will not delay the start of this required study.

Exhibit 1 shows the status of State Highway System projects in the currently adopted long range transportation plan. As shown in Exhibit 1, the next project that is scheduled to receive funding is the construction of turn lanes to improve safety and traffic flow on NW 34th Street (State Road 121).

3. If the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area decides to consider an amendment to the long range transportation plan for the Archer Road project at this time, the following issues will need to be addressed- the need to re-code the travel demand model and to run new traffic assignments to test and evaluate the proposed amendment; the requirement that all cost estimates will need to be updated; and the requirement that all updated project costs will need to be converted to "year of expenditure" dollars and assigned to future five-year groupings associated with the forecast of future revenues.

JOINT RECOMMENDATION

The Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Board, Citizens Advisory Committee, Technical Advisory Committee and Staff recommend not amending the adopted long range transportation plan at this time, but instead address the project priority for Tower Road along with other transportation project priorities over the next two years as part of the Year 2040 long range transportation plan update.

BACKGROUND

A member of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area has requested the following agenda item
*"What federal funds are available for Tower Road from Newberry Road to Archer Road?"

Tower Road is classified as part of the "federal aid system." Therefore, this project is eligible for federal Surface Transportation Program Funds. In order to receive these funds, projects must be included in the "financially feasible" portion of the adopted long range transportation plan.

This project is not included in the adopted Surface Transportation Program Year 2035 Cost Feasible Plan (see attached Table 70). In order for this project to be funded with federal Surface Transportation Program funds, it must be included in Table 70.

June 3, 2013 Meeting

At the June 3, 2013 meeting, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area discussed this project and approved the following motion:

"to direct staff to place on the agenda for an upcoming meeting to consider whether or not to amend the Year 2035 long range transportation plan and, if there is a recommendation to amend the long range transportation plan, then to provide candidate project lists developed by City and County staff that include fiscal impacts and funding sources for the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area to prioritize."

Conclusion

Staff has researched this issue and concluded that the long range transportation plan should not be amended at this time to include this project for the following reasons-

- 1. The long range transportation plan is updated every five years and includes such tasks as: updating goals and objectives; projecting socioeconomic information using the latest information in City of Gainesville and Alachua County Comprehensive Plans; and re-validating the travel demand model. This plan update process addresses transportation issues and projects in a comprehensive and coordinated manner based on the latest policies in locally-adopted comprehensive plans. Since long range plan amendments do not have the benefits of being considered as part of an overall comprehensive transportation planning process, they should be avoided if possible.
- 2. Amending the plan to include this project will not result in the Tower Road project being funded before the next long range transportation plan updated is completed by October 2015. Exhibit 1 shows the status of Surface Transportation Program projects in the currently adopted long range transportation plan.
 - As shown in Exhibit 1, the next project that will be funded with Surface Transportation Program funds is the repayment of the State Infrastructure Bank loan for the Transit Maintenance Facility in Fiscal Year 2015-16. The Florida Department of Transportation will not fund another Surface Transportation Program project until Fiscal Year 2016-17. Amending the long range transportation plan to include this project will not result in Tower Road being funded before the next long range transportation plan is updated by October 2015.
- 3. If the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area decides to consider an amendment to the long range transportation plan for the Tower Road project at this time, the following issues will need to be addressed- the need to re-code the travel demand model and to run new traffic assignments to test and evaluate the proposed amendment; the requirement that all cost estimates will need to be updated; and the requirement that all updated project costs will need to be converted to "year of expenditure" dollars and assigned to future five-year groupings associated with the forecast of future revenues.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

No action required. This material is for information only.

BACKGROUND

At the December 3, 2012 meeting, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area approved a motion to discuss at a future meeting marking unmarked pedestrian crossings on roads within high pedestrian activity areas. One corridor that has been identified for discussion is University Avenue (State Road 26) from Waldo Road west to W. 34th Street.

University Avenue is identified in the adopted long range transportation plan as a "multimodal emphasis corridor" (see project priority number 3 in Exhibit 1). Multimodal emphasis corridors are defined as

"major transportation facilities which accommodate automobile, truck, bus, bicycle and pedestrian travel and link different modes together, such as bikes on buses, car and walk and/or park and ride. These projects employ policies and design elements that ensure that the safety and convenience of all users of a transportation system are considered in all phases of project planning and development. Typical elements of a multimodal corridor include sidewalks, bicycle lanes (or wide, paved shoulders), shared-use bicycle and pedestrian paths, designated bus lanes, safe and accessible transit stops and frequent and safe crossings for pedestrians, including median islands, accessible pedestrian signals, and curb extensions."

The Department has had preliminary discussions with Comm. Hawkins and the City of Gainesville regarding the policy and procedures to mark/stripe existing unmarked crosswalks. Each proposed location for a marked crosswalk would need a signed and sealed engineering study as outlined in section 3.8.4 of the Department's Traffic Engineering Manual (TEM). Should the City of Gainesville wish FDOT to pursue funding and analysis for the recommended locations, the MTPO should modify the List of Priority Projects to include this request and, in the priority order deemed by the MTPO.

Alternately, the City of Gainesville could coordinate and fund the traffic engineering analysis pursuant to section 3.8.4 of the Department's Traffic Engineering Manual (TEM) and request the MTPO to add requested locations for implementation to the List of Priority Projects for state funding consideration. Last the City of Gainesville could coordinate and fund the traffic engineering analysis and implementation of the project by permit from the Department

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

No action required. This agenda item is for information only.

BACKGROUND

A member of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area has requested an agenda item for the August 5, 2013 meeting to discuss the decision that was made not to four-lane SE 16th Avenue (State Road 226) from Main Street east to Williston Road, but instead construct a transportation system management project that includes several intersection modifications.

One question that has been asked concerning this agenda item is "what actions are needed to return to the original project to four-lane this portion of SE 16th Avenue?" The answer to this question is that it would require the following two actions:

- a majority of City of Gainesville Commissioners and a majority of Alachua County 1. Commissioners present at the meeting would have to vote in favor of a motion to request that the Florida Department of Transportation change back to the original plan to widen from two to four lanes SE 16th Avenue from Main Street east to Williston Road.
- The Florida Department of Transportation would also have to agree to this MTPO request 2. to replace the current transportation system management project with the original plan to four lane SE 16th Avenue from Main Street east to Williston Road.

Table 1 is a timeline for SE 16th Avenue starting when this project was ranked as the number one priority in the adopted Year 2035 State Highway System Cost Feasible Plan. The only Florida Department of Transportation funds programmed for the SE 16th Avenue four-lane project were project development and environmental study funds (approximately \$50,000) and preliminary engineering funds (approximately \$500,000). The only construction funds that have been programmed for the SE 16th Avenue project are for the "Transportation System Management" project (\$1,680,000 in Fiscal Year 2015-16).

Table 2 shows the current funding status of the Transportation System Management Project.
