CALL TO ORDER

Dean Mimms

Chair Doug Robinson, Regional Transit System (RTS) Chief Transit Planner, called the meeting to order at 2:08 p.m.

T. INTRODUCTIONS

Chair Robinson noted that only TAC members and MTPO staff were present and skipped introductions.

II. APPROVAL OF THE MEETING AGENDA

Chair Robinson asked for approval of the agenda.

ACTION: Steve Dopp moved to approve the meeting agenda. Linda Dixon seconded; motion passed unanimously.

III. APPROVAL OF COMMITTEE MINUTES

Mr. Sanderson stated that the December 1, 2010 minutes are ready for approval.

ACTION: Steve Dopp moved to approve the December 1, 2010 TAC minutes. Dean Mimms seconded; motion passed unanimously.

IV. UPCOMING MEETINGS

Mr. Marlie Sanderson, MTPO Director of Transportation Planning, announced that the next MTPO meeting is scheduled for April 4th at 3:00 p.m. in the Jack Durrance Auditorium. He said that the TAC's next meeting, if needed, is scheduled for March 23rd.

V. UNFUNDED PROJECT PRIORITIES

Mr. Sanderson stated that, each year, the MTPO develops priorities for unfunded projects. He said that these priorities are used by the Florida Department of Transportation to develop its Tentative Work Program. He added that this year's draft List of Priority Projects includes projects from the recently adopted Year 2035 Livable Community Reinvestment Plan and from local agency recommendations. He noted that he would discuss tables that may have changes due to review comments that MTPO staff received. He discussed proposed changes and answered questions to Table 1A- Bicycle/Pedestrian Priorities- Enhancement Funds, Table 1B- Bicycle/Pedestrian Priorities- Alachua County-Maintained Facilities, and Table 1C- Bicycle/Pedestrian Priorities- City of Gainesville-Maintained Facilities.

It was a consensus to:

- 1. delete the ADA compliance text from Table 1A- Priority #9;
- 2. note that Table 1B- Priority #1 is in the Tentative Work Program; and
- 3. note that the Table 1C project is partially funded.

Mr. Sanderson noted that appropriate tables were corrected for the limits of the Waldo Road Multiway Project. He asked if there were any questions regarding:

Mr. Michael Escalante, MTPO Senior Planner, noted that the SW 34 Street turn lane project could be placed in Table 9- Safety Priorities.

ACTION: Jeff Hays moved to revise Table 12A- Traffic Operations Priorities- State Highway System to:

- 1. show priority #7 as Campus Development Agreement-partially funded;
- 2. add as new Priority *8, SW 34 Street at Hull Road:
 - o extend southbound left turnlane; and
 - o install northbound exclusive right turnlane variable message board;
- 3. show new Priority "10 location to be at Center Drive/VA entrance; and
- 4. delete draft Priority #11.

Dean Mimms seconded; motion passed 7 to 1.

Vice Chair Rob Brinkman called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

I. INTRODUCTIONS

Vice Chair Brinkman introduced himself and asked others to introduce themselves.

IV. UPCOMING MEETINGS

Mr. Sanderson announced that the next MTPO meeting is scheduled for December 13th at 4:00 p.m. in the Jack Durrance Auditorium. He said that the TAC's next meeting, if needed, is scheduled for January 26th.

V. TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PLAN (TIP) AMENDMENTS

A. DEPOT AVENUE RIGHT-OF-WAY (ROW)

Mr. Sanderson stated that in order to fund a new Depot Avenue Right-Of-Way Acquisition Phase Project, the City of Gainesville will receive a \$1,709,402 Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) allocation of additional Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) HPP funding and will provide a local match of \$2,091,022. He said that this TIP amendment will add \$1,550,402 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2010/2011 and \$2,260,022 in FY 2011/2012 to fund this Depot Avenue ROW Project [4263201] in the FY 2010/2011 – 2014/2015 TIP.

MOTION:Ruth Steiner moved to recommend that the MTPO amend the TIP to add the Depot Avenue ROW Project [4263201]. James Samec seconded, motion passed unanimously.

B. REGIONAL TRANSIT SYSTEM (RTS) MAINTENANCE FACILITY

Mr. Sanderson stated that in order to fund Phase 1 of the Maintenance Facility expansion and replace 42 fareboxes, RTS has been awarded a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5307 Grant for \$10,666,846 and will provide a local match of \$2,666,712. He said that this TIP amendment will add \$13,333,558 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2010/2011 to fund this RTS Phase 1 of 4 Maintenance Facility and 42 Farebox Replacements Project [4299271] in the FY 2010/2011 – 2014/2015 TIP.

MOTION: Rob Brinkman moved to recommend that the MTPO amend the TIP to add the RTS Phase 1 of 4 Maintenance Facility and 42 Farebox Replacements Project [4299271]. Nelle Bullock seconded, motion passed unanimously.

VI. FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (FDOT) TENTATIVE FIVE YEAR WORK PROGRAM

Mr. Sanderson stated that FDOT has submitted the Tentative Work Program to the MTPO for review and comment. He and Ms. Karen Taulbee, FDOT Transportation Specialist discussed the Tentative Work Program and answered questions.

MOTION: James Samec moved to recommend that the MTPO send a letter to FDOT thanking it for the opportunity to review the tentative Work Program. Ruth Steiner seconded, motion passed unanimously.

VII. STATE ROAD 226 (SE 16TH AVENUE) ALTERNATIVES- SCOPING REVIEW

Mr. Sanderson stated that FDOT has requested an opportunity to present the State Road 226 4-laning Project scoping alternatives.

Mr. David Anderson, FDOT Project Manager, discussed the State Road 226 4-laning Project scoping alternatives and answered questions.

MOTION: Ruth Steiner moved to recommend that the MTPO approve the Transportation System Management Alternative and petition the Florida Department of Transportation to relocate State Road 24 anyway." Harvey Budd seconded, motion passed unanimously.

IX. PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PLAN UPDATE

Mr. Sanderson stated that, each year, the MTPO's Public Involvement Plan is reviewed, and revised if necessary, in order to ensure that the MTPO's planning program provides for a proactive public involvement process. He discussed proposed revisions in the draft Plan and answered questions.

MOTION: Harvey Budd moved to recommend that the MTPO revise the Public Involvement Plan to:

- 1. delete references to the Gainesville Voice publication;
- 2. approve the proposed revisions in the attached Exhibit 1; and
- 3. check into televising Coordinating Board, CAC and BPAB meetings that are held in the Grace Knight Conference Room on Channel 12.

Nelle Bullock seconded; motion passed unanimously.

X. DR. KERMIT SIGMON CITIZEN PARTICIPATION AWARD

Mr. Sanderson discussed the annual Dr. Kermit Sigmon Citizen Participation Award and asked the CAC to select someone for the award. He also suggested Ms. Rae Marie Gilbert as a recipient due to her involvement in MTPO and Alachua County transportation issues.

The CAC discussed possible candidates.

MOTION: Harvey Budd moved to select Mark Goldstein as the recipient of the 2010 Dr. Kermit Sigmon Citizen Participation Award. Ruth Steiner seconded; motion passed unanimously.

XI. INFORMATION ITEMS

There was no discussion of the information items.

MTPO STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Recommend that the MTPO approve the Unified Planning Work Program amendment in Exhibit 1.

BACKGROUND

According to the attached email dated March 4, 2011 (Exhibit 2), the City of Gainesville Regional Transit System has received \$425,000 for a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Alternatives Analysis. In order to receive these funds, the MTPO must amend the Unified Planning Work Program to include this Study and these funds. Exhibit 1 contains UPWP amendment materials prepared by Regional Transit System staff.

Exhibit 3 is an excerpt from the Federal Register, dated March 1, 2011, that shows the BRT study funding.

UPWP TASK NUMBER: TASK TITLE:

3.9 Bus Rapid Transit Alternatives Analysis Project

PURPOSE:

The objective of this project is to continue the work performed in the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Feasibility Study. Projects seeking Federal New Starts funding must be based upon the results of an Alternatives Analysis (AA) and later preliminary engineering (49 USC 5309(e)(1)(A)). The AA will identify and compare the costs, benefits, and impacts of a range of transportation alternatives as a means of providing local decision makers with the information necessary to implement the most appropriate transportation solutions in priority corridors.

The AA process should enhance the project's likelihood for success by: (1) selecting an alternative whose scope and cost address the defined problem and whose costs are consistent with expected benefits; (2) developing a realistic financial plan; (3) advancing the development of supportive land use and other policies; and (4) providing analysis and information critical to reaching decisions on the investment strategy to pursue in a particular corridor.

PREVIOUS WORK COMPLETED:

A Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Feasibility Study was completed in March 2010. The results of the study were a priority ranking of the study corridors and the development of a preferred service alignment for an initial BRT project based on the studied corridors.

METHODOLOGY:

The AA should be a collaborative process. According to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) the "AA is the process for reaching a broad consensus on exactly what type of improvement(s) best meet locally defined goals and objectives for a specified corridor." An effective AA answers the critical project development questions:

- What are the problems in a corridor?
- What are their underlying causes?
- What are viable options for addressing these problems?
- What are their costs?
- What are their benefits?

The AA will evaluate viable options for addressing identified problems with a multi-modal approach to offer the greatest improvements in mobility and to alleviate traffic congestion. At a minimum, the Alternatives Analysis will test a no-build scenario, a transportation systems management (TSM) approach, and a BRT scenario. The City of Gainesville Regional Transit System staff will work closely with regional local transportation planning agencies to complete the work.

END PRODUCTS:

The result of the AA will be a report of the alternatives studied with the following types of information: (1) Executive Summary; (2) Introduction; (3) Detailed Definition of Alternatives; (4) Public Involvement; (5) Travel Demand Forecasts and Benefits; (6) Engineering Concepts and Cost Estimates; (7) Transportation Impacts; (8) Environmental Analysis and Impacts; (9) Cost and Financial Analysis; (10) Evaluation of Alternatives; and (11) Conclusions.

The project is set to begin in summer 2011 and anticipated to take twelve (12) to eighteen (18) months to complete. Once the AA is complete, the results will be submitted to the FTA for evaluation and approval to enter project Preliminary Engineering process.

Title: Exploratory Advanced Research (EAR) Program sponsored project titled "Effects of Automated Transit and Pedestrian/Bicycling Facilities on Urban Travel Patterns."

Type of request: New information collection requirement.

Background: The Exploratory Advanced Research (EAR) Program was established to conduct longer term, higher risk research that will result in a potentially dramatic breakthrough for improving the durability, efficiency, environmental impact, productivity, and safety of highway and intermodal transportation systems. FHWA awarded a research project titled "Effects of Automated Transit and Pedestrian/ Bicycling Facilities on Urban Travel Patterns" that was submitted in response to a solicitation in 2009 and supports the EAR Program focus area of new technology and advanced policies for energy and resource conservation. The project conducted by the University of Michigan with support from the University of Illinois at Chicago has the potential to lead to applications for evidence-based policies and approaches that could substantially reduce the percentage and total number of short trips using private vehicles and increase the percentage and number of trips using current and future transit technology and non-motorized trips, which would reduce use and dependence on fossil fuels and associated pollution impacts.

The research project is attempting to gauge potential travel-behavior response to far-reaching improvements in the pedestrian, cycling, and transit environments of neighborhoods. The transit improvements are inspired by the frequency and quality of service that might be made possibility of future technologies. The project is studying the capacity of these improvements to

generate the following kinds of shifts: (1) Modal shift of neighborhood trips from auto to other modes; (2) Increased use of regional public transit based on improved station access; and (3) Shift of more remote non-work destinations to destinations within the neighborhood.

To explore these issues, the research team is building a model that integrates activity-based and agent-based components. The models in turn will be based on a survey of residents in four neighborhoods of metropolitan Chicago. As part of the survey, respondents will be presented with images representing potential improvements to the pedestrian, cycling, and transit environments of their neighborhoods and will respond to scenarios regarding their travel under these altered conditions.

We will mail 7,700 invitations with an expectation of 1,400 residents responding. From that pool, 800 will be selected for the study, which includes a survey packet, travel diary and phone interview.

Respondents: We estimate that 1,400 residents will respond to the initial invitation and 800 residents will participate in the study.

Frequency: This is a one-time collection.

Estimated Average Burden per Response: The invitation portion takes approximately 15 minutes to complete. 1400 residents × 15 minutes = 350 hours.

The research study takes approximately 1 hour and 30 minutes (30 minutes for the survey packet and travel diary and 1 hour for the phone interview).

800 residents × 90 minutes = 1,200 hours.

Estimated Total Annual Burden Hours: The total burden for this onetime information collection would be approximately 1,550 hours.

Grantees selected for competitive discretionary funding should work with their FTA regional office to finalize the application in FTA's Transportation Electronic Award Management system (TEAM) so that funds can be obligated

expeditiously. Funds must be used for the purposes specified in the competitive application. A discretionary project identification number has been assigned to each project for tracking purposes and must be used in the TEAM application. Pre-award authority is granted as of December 21, 2010.

Post-award reporting requirements include submission of the Financial Federal Report and Milestone reports in TEAM as appropriate (see FTA.C.5010.1D).

The grantee must comply with all applicable Federal statutes, regulations, executive orders, FTA circulars, and

other Federal administrative requirements in carrying out the activities supported by the FTA grant. The grantee must initiate the alternatives analysis within 12 months of grant approval unless activities are already underway. Funds allocated in this announcement must be obligated in a grant by September 30, 2013.






Figure 1- Depot Avenue Trail at Waldo Road

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

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ATTENDANCE RULE

Any appointee of the MTPO to the CAC shall be automatically removed from the committee upon filing with the Chairman of the MTPO appropriate proof that such person has had three (3) or more consecutive unexcused absences, or that the overall attendance record of any such person (including excused and unexcused absences) is less than 66-2/3% for any six (6) month consecutive period or less than 66-2/3% for six (6) consecutive meetings if meetings are not held each month, whichever is longer. Excused absences are here defined to be those absences which occur from regular or special meetings after notification by such person to the Chairman prior to such absence explaining the reasons therefore. All other absences are here defined to be unexcused.

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

- 1. On October 30, 1985, staff asked the CAC to clarify the procedures staff should use to record attendance at CAC meetings. The CAC instructed staff to use the following procedures:
 - A. all CAC meetings will require mandatory attendance by all members; and
 - B. attendance is recorded at all CAC meetings, even if a quorum is not present.
- 2. On April 28, 1999, the CAC decided to limit attendance by teleconferencing to medical emergencies only.
- 3. Members denoted in BOLD ITALICs are at risk for attendance rule violation if the next meeting is missed.
